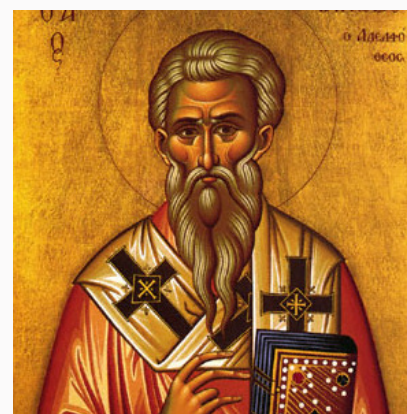

OCMC Mission Team Member Describes an Unforgettable Experience in Indonesia

Earlier this year, Matthew Augenstein went to Indonesia as part of an OCMC short-term mission team. We asked him to tell you about his experience.

There are moments when time seems to stand still. Our OCMC team experienced one of these moments when arriving at a grade school run by the Orthodox Church in Medan, on the island of Sumatra in Indonesia. As we approached the school, we could see children and adults quickly moving into position from the grounds and school buildings.

As we entered, the students formed in rows on either side of a path

leading to the main courtyard. In the center, teachers in traditional Indonesian dress danced together slowly in an elegant row. Father Chrysostom, one of the founders of Orthodoxy in Indonesia and our host during the trip, showed us how to move our hands in front of us as we walked, to show we accepted and returned this traditional greeting.

As the beaming faces of the children came into view, all looking intently at us, the beauty of this moment transcended anything I had ever experienced. Any fear I might have felt disappeared as we joined together in instant communion as

brothers and sisters in Christ. The memory of the warmth, joy, and hospitality of this greeting will stay with me for the rest of my life.

Fr. Chrysostom Manalu, the priest in Matthew's story on the front of this issue, serves several parishes in Indonesia. He has also worked to bring much needed healthcare to people in Medan, a large city on the island of Sumatra. He has also worked to establish a technical college and a seminary.

Fr. Stephanos Boik is a parish priest in Indonesia. He also directs an orphanage that is home to 15 children, and runs a food bank that serves many children in need in his community.

These holy men are two of 17 priests across Asia who receive financial help from OCMC's Support a Mission Priest (SAMP) program. This allows them to focus on their parish and ministry work, instead of having to put time and energy into a secular job, as so many priests do.

Because of the increasing demand for Orthodox clergy in mission fields around the world, our goal is to add at least five more priests to the SAMP program in the coming months. That's *if we have the funding*.

They've kept very busy since their arrival in Ulsan, which is in southeast South Korea. Their parish had been without a priest for more nearly two years, and Fr. Chris reports that "most parish families had not had a house blessing in some time." Blessing houses is a great way to meet parishioners, especially since "our community has a tradition of house blessings as a community event: together on a Sunday after Liturgy we visit homes, pray, and after a few homes have been prayed over, have fellowship time in the last home before people head their separate ways."

Of course, there are many challenges — not least of which the language, which Fr. Chris, Mat. Jen, and their young sons Andrew and Gideon are all working hard to learn. They request your prayers as they continue this process! Despite the challenges, Fr. Chris says the parish "seems ready to start engaging more fully in being Christ's Church in this city."

She Left a Legacy That Reaches Around the World

Maine Angel Maria had a heart filled with love — for her family, for her Faith, and for sharing that Faith with people around the world. Her story reaches back to her family's homeland of Cyprus. Long ago, they moved to Lebanon, and more recently to the United States, where Maine was born in the state that shares her name. After attending St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Cathedral in Tarpon Springs, Florida, for many years, she moved to Allen, Texas, where she was a member of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church for two decades.



Maine Maria of blessed memory remembered OCMC in her will before her repose, and her generosity is still touching lives today.

Maine loved the idea of sharing the Orthodox Faith in lands most people only read about in storybooks. Even if she never visited those lands herself, she knew she was helping share the Gospel through her support of OCMC. Over the next two days we played group games with the children and gave instruction in English language and Christian living. The gratitude and love that were shown in that initial greeting continued throughout our stay. Children from kindergarten to high school age would reach out their hand for ours and press our palms gently into their foreheads as a sign of honor and respect.

We often think that serving others is our primary mission on a short-term trip. It's easy to forget that one of the most important teachings in cross-cultural ministry is receiving hospitality. We are invited to receive the embrace of our brothers and sisters, and accept and return their love and gratitude. Our shared humanity and connection in Christ can transcend barriers and transform their lives and ours. My life will never be the same.
